The Treasure of Oak Island

Over the past two hundred years, treasure hunters have flocked to Oak Island, off the coast of the Canadian province of Nova Scotia. Millions of dollars have been spent in attempts to excavate a 170-foot pit, where submerged wooden chests filled with precious jewels and gold coins await someone with the engineering genius to remove them.

According to legend Oak Island was put under a curse in 1720. During that year mainlanders saw strange flickering lights on the island. (1) By using subterfuge, several people ventured close enough to see huge bonfires and large groups of pirates hard at work. (2) These people were said to have died mysteriously after reporting the surreptitious activity. (3) Two men who rowed in to inspect the pirates' activity were not furtive enough; they were never seen again. (4) Rumors of flagrantly illegal activity were circulated but were never proved. (5) The pirates had sequestered themselves and their activities quite well.

The curse remained until 1795, when three young men landed on Oak Island. Out for a day of canoeing and exploring, they soon noticed a pulley device from an old ship that was nailed to the trunk of a large oak tree. (6) The most salient feature of the pulley was its

position directly over a depressed square of earth. Daniel McInnes, Jack Smith, and Tony Vaughan were convinced that they had found the site of pirate treasure.

The next day the three returned to Oak Island with shovels, axes, and picks. They found an old clay-lined shaft, seven feet wide and refilled with loose dirt. Shoveling out tons of dirt, they also discovered platforms of heavy oak planks located at ten, twenty, and thirty feet. Thirty feet beneath the surface, they were no closer to a bottom of any sort. After weeks of digging, the young men were forced to return to their farming.

McInnes, Smith, and Vaughan had not given up their dream, however. (7) They still believed that they had found a latent source of incredible wealth. (8) By making unobtrusive inquiries, they found Dr. John Lynds, who, inspired by their enthusiastic tales, raised capital to buy equipment and hire labor. Working furiously, the diggers excavated to one hundred feet below the surface. When they struck a solid layer, they believed that they had found the last barrier to the treasure. (9) Deciding to rest until morning, the excited treasure-hunters dreamed of flaunting their riches to their neighbors. Their expectations were shattered, however. The

next morning the shaft was filled with sixty feet of water. No amount of bailing or pumping could reduce the level of the water, which seemed to flow into the shaft through some underground source.

Since the Oak Island treasure pit was discovered in 1795, thirty to forty separate expeditions have been mounted to try to unearth the treasure. All of the work done over the years has yielded only a bone whistle shaped like a violin and three heavy links of a gold chain. (10) Engineers have ostensibly come to understand the construction of the tunnels and shafts; however, the sophisticated drilling equipment, hydraulic pumps, metal detectors, dynamite blasts, and bulldozers that they have used have failed to reveal what lies buried in what has come to be known as the "money pit."

Whether the treasure turns out to be the gold of the Incas, the loot of the pirate Captain Kidd, the plunder of Spanish explorers, or the never-recovered jewels of Marie Antoinette, treasure hunters are sure of one thing. The treasure must be extraordinarily valuable to have warranted the conception and construction of a hiding place that has defied the best talents of the modern engineering

world.
