JHS Food & Toy Drives

Each year, Henry M. Jackson High School holds two community charity drives: a food drive and our Henry the Giving Snowman toy drive. Since the school's inception, these charitable drives have supported thousands of people in our community. What makes these drives so unique is that they are truly local, with all donations of toys and food staying in our community. The need in our community only continues to grow each year, so these drives are as important, or more, than ever.

The first drive this year is Henry the Giving Snowman, which is our annual toy drive. This drive will run from Monday, November 28, through Friday, December 9. Students and staff members can drop off toys any time at Henry the Giving Snowman, which is set up just outside of the Commons. There will also be a community drop-off donation day on Tuesday, December 6, from 2:30 to 5:00 in front of the school, where anyone from our community can drop off toy donations for the toy drive. Donated toys must be new and unwrapped. Our goal is to collect at least 500 toys (though more than that would be amazing!), and all donated toys will go directly to families in the Everett School District, meaning all donations will truly impact our own community.

Also in December is our annual food drive, which has been going since the school opened. Originally, we collected food to donate to the Salvation Army, but around 10 years ago, a group of students noticed an increasing need for help in Mill Creek. So, Jackson High School created and housed the first Mill Creek Community Food Bank, with our annual food drive being the primary source of food. Since then, Hope Creek Charitable has taken over operation of the food bank, which now operates from behind Gold Creek Community Church.

This year's food drive will run from Monday, December 5 through Saturday, December 17. Staff and students can drop off food donations in their 1st period class (or whichever class is their first if they don't have a 1st period class) any time during the drive. Then, the big finish will be on Saturday, December 17, at JHS; this will be our big community drop-off day and our last big push. We will have the food bank truck at the school from 11:00 to 4:00, and anyone can drive to the school and drop off food donations. All donations go to the Mill Creek Community Food Bank so, again, it all supports our own community.

All of this is a huge ask, matched only by the huge need that exists within our community. Our friends, family, classmates, neighbors, and others in our community need our help every day, and this is just one way in which we can create intentionality around supporting that need. As much as the phrase "It takes a village" seems appropriate here, I prefer to say "It takes a community." Mill Creek is quite an incredible community, and I know we can all come together to make a difference at this time.



Athletics Recaps

The fall sports season concluded post-season play in November, and we are now heading into our winter sports season. The JHS girls' bowling team is off to an excellent start with a 3-0 record. All other winter sports have not had any contests. Following are highlights of our fall sports teams.

Volleyball

The girls varsity volleyball team had an excellent performance this fall, finishing the regular season with an impressive record of 12-4. In a seeding playoff game for 2nd and 3rd in Wesco, Jackson defeated Glacier Peak 3-0. After dropping their first match in the Wes-King District Tournament to Eastlake, the Timberwolves prevailed over Issaquah in a thrilling 3-2 sets victory. In a loser out game, Jackson punched their ticket to state for the second year in a row by defeating Bothell 3-0, and two days later had a huge victory over Skyline, winning again 3-0. Both of these district matches were held at the opponent's gym. At the state volleyball tournament the team finished in an impressive 7th place. After losing their first match of the tournament to Curtis they came through the losers' bracket winning the rest of their matches, defeating Richland, West Valley, and #2 seed North Creek in a thrilling five-setter. *Coach Staudinger, Coach Crownininshield, and Coach McGlocklin*

Boys and Girls XC

The boys and girls cross-country teams ran well all season and had excellent performances at the 4A Wesco championships in Arlington. Sophomore girls cross-country runner Selena Bangerter won the girls 4A Wesco race with an impressive race, and Jackson also had a strong finish by 2nd place finisher junior Emma Hamm. The varsity girls team advanced to the bi-district 4A meet, finishing 2nd just 4 points behind the Wesco champions, Lake Stevens. At the 4A Wesco varsity boys race, senior Noah Friedrich led the team and finished in 4th place with senior Aarav Singh placing 9th. The boys team also advanced to the bi-district championship where they finished 3rd at Wesco. Three girls Jackson XC participants ran at the state meet in Pasco and were led by Emma Hamm, who crossed the line in 12th; Selena Bangerter finished 24th and Olivia Friedich finished 62nd out of 160 runners in the race. Senior male runner Araav Sing competed in his first state meet with a 44th placing. Girls Swim and Dive

Jackson girls swim and dive wrapped up their season with a perfect record for the regular season, winning Wesco. The team went on to win the Wesco 4A District One championship in Snohomish, resulting in sending 11 athletes on to state. At state, the team finished 5th overall with a great showing in several events including 6th and 8th place for divers Lauren Wierschke (senior) and Anna-lyn Wilson. Freshman Elissa Anderson placed 2nd in 200 free and 7th in 100 fly, and sophomore Olivia Hoyla placed 4th in the 200 IM and 6th in the 100 fly. The 200 free relay and 400 free relay, consisting of Elissa Anderson, Julia Song, Celina Hernandez-Murillo, and Olivia Hoyla, finished 6th and 5th. *Coach Whorley and Coach Barrett*

Boys Tennis

The defending 4A state champion Jackson boys tennis team won Wesco and district titles this fall and finished the season with an incredible 14-2 record. The team played extremely well throughout the season and were led by sophomore Ben Lee, who won the district singles title for the 2nd year in a row, and junior Henry Park and freshman David Song, who won the district doubles title. All three of these players were undefeated in all their matches and will be playing at the state tennis meet in May to see if they can win back-to-back state team titles. Austen Lim placed 3rd in the district singles tournament and was October Athlete of the Month for Jackson High. *Coach Hutt*

Football

This year was full of growing pains for our pack. Almost 90% of our players started in a varsity game for the first time ever this season. We learned what it means to compete at this level and what hard work and discipline look like, and we forged bonds that will last a lifetime. Each year, our brotherhood grows stronger as we strive every day to be 3 Strong. Although the scoreboard may not have reflected it, we showed growth and development as the season progressed and look to carry that momentum into the off season as we relentlessly work to get better and rise up. Girls Soccer

The girls varsity soccer team made huge strides this season after graduating eight seniors off of last year's team to finish their season with an overall record of 6-7-2. They played their hearts out and competed all year, finishing 2nd in Wesco and advancing to the Wes/King district tournament, where they battled hard but ended up losing against two state contender teams of Woodinville, 4-0, and Eastlake, 2-0. The Timberwolves were led this year by senior captains Maggie Ayedelott, Mackie Quiyono, and Payton Hubert. Jackson had four players who made First Team All-Wesco Honors: Maggie Aydelott (defender), Quinlyn McAuliffe (midfield), Tia Schwetz (forward), and Payton Hubert (goalie). Guaranteed Admissions Program

We are excited to announce Everett Public Schools is now a participating institution in the Guaranteed Admission Program, or GAP.

Everett Public Schools has partnered with Central Washington University, Eastern Washington University, The Evergreen State College, Washington State University, and Western Washington University to help students meet their college and career goals through the Guaranteed Admissions Program (GAP). Through GAP, a student who meets the following criteria is guaranteed admission to these institutions.



To qualify for the Guaranteed Admissions Program, a student must have:

- 1. A minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0
- 2. Completed necessary College Academic Distribution Requirements (CADR) courses in high school (typically mirrors high school grad requirements)
- 3. Completed this <u>Guaranteed Admissions Program Opt-In Form</u> giving your permission to release information to the participating colleges and universities

The <u>Guaranteed Admissions Program Opt-In Form</u> is for parents/guardians of current <u>juniors</u> and <u>seniors</u> of Everett Public Schools high schools. The deadline for completing this form is Friday, January 6, 2023.

The Gift of Attendance

Board of Distinction

Everett Public Schools board of directors earned high honors with the designation as a *Board of Distinction 2022*. Applications are reviewed by a panel of judges that includes former and current educational service district superintendents, State Board of Education board members, former school directors, and other education leaders in Washington state. Scoring is based on how well applicants show alignment with the Washington School Board Standards, support their statements with data, and demonstrate a link between outcomes and decisions made by the board.



Accepting Highly Capable Referrals until December 16

The Highly Capable program in Everett Public Schools is designed to meet learning needs and challenge students who have advanced thinking and academic abilities. "HC" classes, as they are often referred to, are open to students in 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th grades.

HC students learn and study in self-contained classrooms with a fast-paced curriculum that encourages and inspires them to develop higher-level thinking skills. HC classrooms are held in specific schools in the district, based upon qualified enrollment. The district provides transportation to students in HC classes.

Space Still Available in ECEAP Preschool

Everett Public Schools Early Childhood Education & Assistance Program (ECEAP) is a FREE preschool program for three- and four-year-old children from families with limited income. ECEAP prepares children for kindergarten and provides family support and health and nutrition services. It is funded by the Washington State Department of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF).

The six ECEAP sites within our school district are Cedar Wood, Hawthorne, Jackson, Lowell, Madison, and Silver Lake elementary schools. Space is limited—apply now! For an application or more information, please visit www.everettsd.org/ECEAP or call 425-385-4628.



Transitional Kindergarten Program

Everett Public Schools offers Transitional Kindergarten (TK) for children who are not currently in an early learning program and are scheduled to enter kindergarten in the fall of 2023. The program focuses on basic academic, social, and self-help skills to jumpstart qualifying students toward success in school. Students will be screened and may qualify based on need.

To be eligible for screening, children must:

- be five years old by August 31, 2023
- live within the boundaries of Everett Public Schools
- not be currently enrolled in an early learning program
- demonstrate academic and/or social-emotional needs

Requests for screening opened in November. If you are interested in Transitional Kindergarten and believe your child may qualify, please visit our website at www.everettsd.org/TransitionalKindergarten and submit an interest form by **Friday**, **December 16**, **2022**.

Transitional Kindergarten begins in late January 2023 and will run through the last day of school in June 2023. School locations will be determined in January and will be communicated directly to eligible families. For preschool options, please visit our Early Childhood Education & Assistance Program (ECEAP) webpage at www.everettsd.org/ECEAP.


