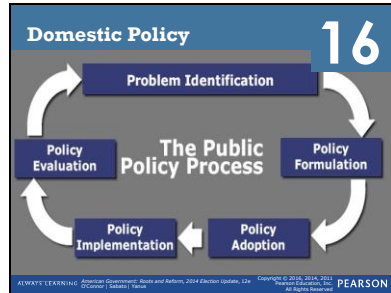

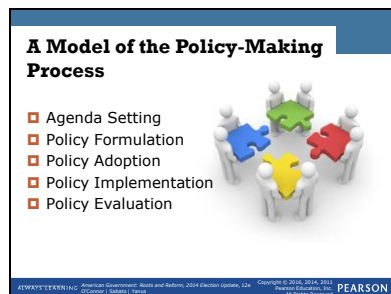

There are five different stages of the policy-making process.

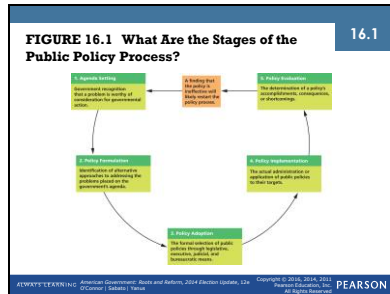
- Agenda setting involves deciding which issues will be discussed and addressed.
- Policy formation is a period in which actual, proposed courses of action are suggested and written.
- Policy adoption is approval of any given policy.
- Adoption is followed by
- Policy implementation, which is the carrying out of the policies.
- Policy evaluation, is where political actors assess how well a given policy seemed to work.

Public policy problems are circumstances that can be addressed by government action. One example is disaster relief. During and after Hurricane Katrina, the New Orleans Centre housed thousands of people displaced by the storm in appalling circumstances never before seen on such a massive basis in the United States.
