

Dear Parents,

Welcome to 2014! I always love coming back to school in January. It seems like the work we have done with students in the fall is showing a good deal of progress as we begin this part of the year. Students and staff have returned after the winter break with renewed energy and enthusiasm. I see students and staff all over the building busy with the important job of teaching and learning. Thank you for making sure your child is here every day unless he/she is running a fever or very ill. It is hard to send home the discussions and learning that happens in the classroom on a daily basis.

This year we are implementing the Eight-Step Instructional Improvement Model at our school. Two of the steps focus on Success Time, which provides 30-minutes of tutorial or enrichment for students every day. If you are at the school in the morning, you will see a school-wide transition as students move to their Success Time groups at 8:45 each morning. During this time the school is very quiet, as students engage in specific tutorials or enrichment activities supporting literacy. In addition to implementing Success Time, Woodside teachers are busy aligning their teaching of reading, writing and math with Common Core State Standards. In the area of science, we have added a "System of the Month" strategy to support student learning of systems. Fifth grade teacher, Ted Vasei, has an article in this newsletter with more information about the program.

I am excited to share that we have successfully launched a Natural Leaders Program at our school beginning with our Hispanic families. This leadership program promotes stronger connections between parents, community and the school. We welcome opportunities for parents to engage in the education of their children. I am grateful for the work of our fabulous Natural Leader Parent Facilitator, Ms. Sandra Mejia.

Monday, January 20th is a national holiday to honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Dr. King won the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964. These words are from his acceptance speech: "Sooner or later, all the people of the world will have to discover a way to live together in peace...We must evolve for all human conflict a method which rejects revenge, aggression and retaliation. The foundation of such a method is love." Dr. King was an inspiration for us all. His dream for America focused on fighting the war on poverty, promoting world peace and standing up for the equal rights for all people. We must renew our commitment to the ideal that we will not judge people by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character. Like Martin Luther King, Woodside students have the potential to make our world a better place. Watch for the dreams of Woodside students that will be posted and



displayed throughout the school.

Lastly, Woodside teachers are busy assessing students, analyzing data, looking at student work, and planning for instruction. Watch for progress reports for the first semester of school, which will be sent home with students on Friday, February 7. Contact the school if you have questions about your child's progress. Way to go Seahawks! It was truly an amazing season marked by broken records and phenomenal stats from players who demonstrate many growth mindset characteristics. For example:

Did you know that **Pete Carroll** was fired from an NFL coaching job? Twice?? Instead of giving up, Pete used this failure as an opportunity to review his life goals and his beliefs about himself as a person and as a coach. He filled up journal after journal with notes about what he believed and what he wanted out of life. Pete views failures as opportunities to learn and grow! Viewing mistakes as opportunities to grow is evidence of a growth mindset!

Russell Wilson is only 5 feet, 11 inches tall, making him the shortest starting quarterback in the NFL. And as a 3rd round draft pick, he was predicted to be a back-up quarterback at best. Now he's the starting quarterback in the Super Bowl after only two seasons and is considered to be one of the NFL's best!

Derrick Coleman is the only legally deaf player in the NFL. No one would draft him because he can't hear. Der-rick refused to take "you can't" for an answer because he believed in his own potential and so did the Sea-hawks' coaching staff. Believing in your potential to overcome adversity is also evidence of a growth mind-set!

Richard Sherman grew up in Compton in an area riddled with gang violence. His own father was shot by a stray bullet and still bears the scar. Richard Sherman overcame this adversity and graduated from one of the most prestigious schools in the United States: Stanford University. How did he do it? By having a growth mindset. He persisted and developed his skills. He's currently the best at his cornerback position in the NFL!

Marshawn Lynch is one of the superstars of the team. It often takes 4-6 people to tackle him! He gains more yards after contact than any other player in the NFL. Why? Because he never gives up and he never stops moving his feet forward! Persistence is a part of a growth mindset.

Be like the Seahawks—have a growth mindset for success in school and life! You don't have to be successful the first time you try something! You can change, you can improve... don't be afraid to struggle! When you make a mistake, view it as an opportunity to learn. Believe in your own potential! Don't take "you can't" as an answer! Be persistent, keep going, and don't give up!

Did you know?

Lots of valuable information about how our school is helping students achieve is available online.

Our School Performance Report is linked directly from our school's home page. (Look under Quick-Links for a link to OSPI Washington State School Report Card.) At that site you can browse through historical performance data for more than a decade – for any school in the district or the state. By following the prompts on that OSPI website, you can also find current and historical data aggregated at the district level.

Among information available on that site you will find that **Hawthorne, Emerson and Silver Lake elementary schools** listed by the federal government as a "Focus," "Emerging," or "Reward" school respectively. This means those schools qualify for additional federal funding to support work to improve student learning.

Silver Lake Elementary and North Middle School

have also each recently named by the state of Washington as "Schools of Distinction" for the way they have steadily sustained student learning improvement over the years. (You can see more details about Silver Lake and North and the entire list of award-winning schools since 2005 online.)

Madison Elementary School was also designated as only one of two schools in the state to receive national recognition as a Title I School of Distinction. They were selected by OSPI for this designation because the work being done there as a Title I school (a school with a large proportion of students from poverty-impacted families) is exemplary. The principal and members of the Madison staff will share their teaching methods and ways of involving families in student learning with other schools from around the nation.

Getting Children to Write Thank-You Notes



The holidays have passed us by, and hopefully your children have much to be thankful for from family, friends and other gift givers. Have your children said thank-you to you? Have they written their thank-you notes?

If your children are just starting to get into the habit of writing thank-you notes, here are a few suggestions:

If at all possible, make it an expectation that thankyou notes are to be written immediately... maybe even before the gift gets to be played with or used. Let the gift become a natural motivator to writing a thank-you note.

In addition to reminding your children about the parts of a thank-you note (greeting, body, closing, signature), provide a few suggestions of content. As a general rule, encourage children to write one sentence thanking the giver for the gift and at least one sentence detailing why he/she liked the gift, how it will be used, and/or the best part about it.

If your child is able to write but still finds spelling or lengthy writing projects difficult, create a fill-inthe-blank-style note. Write out a basic form letter and allow him/her to fill in essential words or key phrases that would personalize the thank-you for that particular recipient. For early writers, drawings can be fun.

Help your child make a short list of more difficult words to be included in the note. If a child has several notes to write, write a few writing prompts onto a sample sheet of paper so that they can quickly add or subtract the words needed for each individual gift.

Encourage sincere gratitude by creating an enjoyable writing experience. If you can, provide special pens, stickers, or card making supplies to make writing thank-you notes a fun event.

Your kids will be more apt to show gratefulness when they see you leading by example. Make it a habit of writing out thank-yous in front of your children. If a gift was provided to the entire family, allow each of your kids to include a few words of gratitude into a group-given thank-you note. Although sincere gratefulness cannot be forced, it CAN be nurtured and encouraged by the helpful habit of writing out thank-you notes. And with all these thank-yous being composed, hopefully you will get even more thank-yous in person from your children.

Natural Leaders



The Natural Leaders program was developed in 2003 with parents in Shoreline, Everett, Edmonds, Marysville, Monroe, Mukilteo and Northshore schools to create liaisons between schools and families. Natural Leaders are parents from Woodside,

trained to coordinate parent engagement activities at the school. This is especially important for immigrant and refugee parents, whose language and cultural barriers often leave them feeling marginalized. Natural Leaders bring families together to work on the shared goals of children's school success, parents' involvement in children's learning, parents' continuing education, and to present school-wide activities. Woodside's Natural Leaders' work began on January 17th with their first official leadership training session led by Sandra Mejia. Woodside's team will follow up with regular team meetings to share what families are telling them, discuss families' needs, plan activities and coordinate school and community events. Natural Leaders will also respond to families' needs by working with community partners.

Woodside Rolls Out "System of the Month"

We at Woodside are always examining our data to address student needs. Looking at our most recent Science MSP data, we saw that students needed a better understanding of systems (different parts that work together to perform a function). This includes naming the system's parts and the job they each do, how they work together, how adding/subtracting/ changing the parts affects how well the system works, and the system's input (how the system "gets going") and output (what the system "does").

Once a month, all classroom teachers in grades K-5 are introducing a new system to discuss, with the goal being by 5th grade, all students will develop a thorough understanding of systems. Teachers are provided with detailed pictures of the system, and a teacher's guide to direct the discussion. Our January System of the Month was handheld snow shovels, and February's is desktop computers. Upcoming systems include tetherballs, bicycles, rollerskates and rollercoasters.

We are purposely selecting systems that will be high-interest for students, and that they may be familiar with. Already, students are having side conversations of their own about different systems found in classrooms and around the school!

You can help your student develop their knowledge of systems by choosing multi-part objects around the house (such as a can opener) or in your travels (such as a ski lift). A quick guide to what you might discuss is:

Review the definition of a system.

- a "system" is made up of different parts that work together to perform a function
- name the parts and the job they each do
- discuss and explain how the parts work together to perform a function
- discuss and explain how the system would be affected if certain parts are removed (or sometimes, added)
- discuss and explain the system's input and output

We thank you for helping your student develop their knowledge of science, and welcome any comments you'd like to share!

Fifth Grade Engineers

It's the most natural thing for a child: build something, play with it, wreck it, and then build a better one. At Woodside, we're taking that to a more scientific level. Fifth graders are using the Engineering is Elementary Civil Engineering kit to develop their engineering expertise during our morning Success Time. Students have studied real-life situations where bridges have failed and the lessons learned from them. After careful study of the forces bridges must withstand, students are designing bridges to meet cost, stability and strength criteria, and testing them to failure. Their challenge is to redesign their bridge to increase strength and stability, while also reducing cost. This is giving our students a head start on the Next Generation Science Standards that are rolling out nationwide in the next two years. It also supports Common Core standards

of reading informational text, writing informative/ explanatory text, and developing skills necessary for formal presentations.

At Woodside, we're always searching for the most engaging and challenging activities for students to participate in. You can have your child engage in engineering activities at home with Legos, Kinex sets, or even cardboard pieces. Have them build a structure, see how much weight it can hold before collapsing, and challenge them to build a new one that uses fewer pieces or holds more. Working together, we can help all students become Super Scientists and Excellent Engineers!

A Message from Woodside's Deputy Erin

Hello Woodside Families!

I want to take a moment to introduce myself. Some of you have met me in passing, yet many of you may wonder why there is often a police vehicle at Woodside. My name is Deputy Erin McIntyre, and I am your assigned deputy from the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office School Services Unit. I am grateful for the opportunity to work together with Dr. Cobbs, the wonderful staff here at Woodside, as well as the PTA, and all of you to help ensure that each of the students have an opportunity to thrive in a safe learning environment.

I have been a police officer for over 13 years and have primarily worked as a uniformed deputy working patrol, responding to 911 calls and other emergencies. For the past 9 years I have served in the role of Defensive Tactics Instructor for the Sheriff's Office with the responsibility of equipping our deputies with the skills necessary to do their assigned duties safely. Safety is a passion of mine, especially personal safety. I love to teach and watch people become empowered with knowledge and skills, all while discovering their value and strength!

In addition to Woodside Elementary, I am assigned to eleven other schools in the area. The Sheriff's Office formed the School Services Unit to provide service and act as a resource liaison to schools in unincorporated Snohomish County that do not have a full time School Resource Officer. We recognize that a safe learning environment requires a partnership with law enforcement, the schools and the district, along with the families in the school community. I am available to Woodside not only to provide a resource relating to safety issues concerning the school, but also to mentor students and provide education when appropriate.



Over the last number of months your student has likely seen me before school, at lunch or during recess. In December, I began a series of Character Lessons in the 5th grade classrooms. These Character Lessons are designed to reinforce concepts that the students are learning both in their classroom and with Mr. Lerner. The 5th graders seemed to really enjoy the introduction to Character Lessons and were eager to know when I would be back again!

I appreciate the warm welcome I have received from Woodside. You are fortunate to be part of a community that is open to working together, sometimes in nonconventional and creative ways, in order to impact the lives of our students. Together we are working to set them up for success!

This is the eighth year the WSSA has teamed up with teachers, physical educators, and youth leaders from



What's happening in music this February and March?

In 3rd, 4th, and 5th Grade we have been reading and writing music on the staff. Learning to read music is an important skill that will help us prepare for our recorder unit in March! Ask your child what notes the lines and spaces represent on the music staff to help them practice! We will also begin studying instruments of the orchestra and instrument families (woodwind, brass, strings, and percussion) in February.

2nd Grade has been working on reading, writing, and performing quarter notes (ta) and eighth notes (ti-ti). We will also begin studying instrument families (woodwind, brass, strings, and percussion) as we learn about the different individual instruments and what they sound and look like.

The 1st Graders have started preparing for our upcoming Concert: Old McDonald Had a Farm, which will be on Thursday, March 13th at 7:00PM. The concert features animal songs from our music curriculum, which allows us to develop and learn 1st grade musical concepts and skills as we prepare for our performance. More information on the concert will be sent home in February.

The Kindergarteners are working on keeping a steady beat as they continue to learn new songs and singing games. As you listen to music in the car or at home, ask your kindergartner to find the beat!

Recorders begin in March in Music Class for 3rd, 4th, and 5th Graders!

In 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade, we will begin playing recorders in March. A note will be sent home in the middle of February explaining when the students need to start bringing their recorders to music class and how a recorder can be ordered if your child doesn't already own one. If you are not able to purchase a recorder, school recorders are available for use during music class. Learning recorder is an important aspect of the music curriculum since it reinforces all of our musical skills and concepts, while also preparing students for further musical study in band or orchestral

To help reinforce music at home, please always encourage your child to show you new or favorite songs from music class. The more each student practices at home, the more progress they will make!
