

Dear Woodside Families:

I can hardly believe that March is already here, the time has flown by and I am pleased with all the progress we have accomplished. There are few things in life that everyone can agree on, but it is safe to say that we all value the importance of being able to read with fluency and understanding. Reading is a priority at our school and we take pride in providing a variety of ways for students to learn. In addition to the regular classroom instruction, Woodside students participate in Success Time for thirty minutes of focused literacy instruction to increase reading comprehension every day. Without adequate comprehension skills, reading is simply following words on a page from left to right while sounding them out. The words on the page have no meaning when read in isolation. And while people read for many different reasons, the chief goal is to derive meaning and understanding of what the writer is trying to convey and make use of that information – whether for fact gathering, learning a new skill, or for pleasure. Without comprehension, the reader will not be able to make predictions about what will happen next, monitor their understanding of the content, sequence or characters, clarify confusing parts of the text, or connect the reading to their own experience or prior knowledge. Without strong comprehension skills, the reader cannot gather any information and use it to efficiently function and enjoy the richness of life.

Developing capable readers also requires reading at home. Here is what you can do to strengthen your child's reading skills:

- We ask each student to read at home every night. Reading logs or recording sheets come home with your child to help us monitor reading activity. Please establish a daily time for your child to read at home, and sign and return reading logs in a timely manner.
- Monitor what your child is reading. Listen while they read to see if the reading level is appropriate for his/her skills. The best reading practice and learning will happen at his/her reading level. If you find the book is too difficult for your child, it may be a good book for you to read to them.
- Use the "five-finger" test to determine if a book is too difficult. Open the book to the middle and have him/her read a page. For each reading error he/she makes, hold out a finger. One finger means the book is OK, three fingers means it could be a bit difficult, and five fingers means that you should choose another book.
- Have your child read aloud to you on a regular basis. Oral reading will help develop reading fluency.

- Ask for a "re-tell" of what they read and expect specific details about characters and events in the story. This will show you if they have a good understanding of what they are reading and if they are making progress in the book.
- When your child is "stuck" on a word, wait and give them a chance to try to solve the problem themselves.
- When your child puts in the wrong word, wait and let them get to the end of the sentence then ask if what they read made sense. Ask if they know a word that would make better sense.
- Ask your child about pictures in books. Looking at pictures can help them understand the story, predict what will happen, and add relevancy to the story.
- Be a good reading role model for your child. Read with them, visit the library, and set reading goals and rewards with your child.

Working together, we can help ALL students develop strong comprehension reading skills.

On another note, Parent-teacher conferences are right around the corner, March 24th-28th. We are thankful for your support of the learning program at Woodside. These conferences are a valuable opportunity for you to discuss the academic and social growth of your child. I encourage and invite ALL parents to meet with teachers during this week. I am excited about keeping the lines of communication open so we can combine our efforts to continue to make this a successful year for everyone at Woodside.



Connect, Support, Grow:

FROM THE DESK OF MS. CARNELL, ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL

Parents can make a significant impact on their children's success at school by extending learning at home. Children are naturally curious, and speaking with your child about science will help them to turn their natural curiosity into critical thinking skills that they can apply across the curriculum.

Change, Constancy and Measurement

The natural world changes continually. Some objects change rapidly and some at a rate too slow for us to observe. You can encourage your child to look for changes by asking him to observe and talk about:

What happens to breakfast cereal when we pour milk on it? Connect what you observe happening to the cereal to other objects that are exposed to moisture.

What happens over time when a plant isn't watered or exposed to proper sunlight? Compare the differences and similarities in plants that are not watered or do not have exposure to sunlight.

What changes can be reversed? How can you prove this? Once water is turned into ice cubes, can it be turned back into water? Yes. But if an apple is cut into slices, can the slices be changed back into the whole apple?

Children can observe change more carefully through measurement. Keeping a growth chart or making a graph of the temperature each day will give your child practice looking for differences and measuring them — and help her to understand how she'll need to use math skills in learning science.

Cambio, Constancia y Medidas

El mundo natural cambia constantemente. Algunos objetos cambian rápidamente y otros tan lentamente que no podemos observar los cambios directamente. Usted puede alentar a su niño a buscar cambios al pedirle que observe y hable sobre:

Qué sucede con el cereal cuando le agregamos leche?

¿Qué sucede si el tiempo pasa y no regamos nuestras plantas o las exponemos a la luz del sol debida?

iquest;Qué cambios se pueden reversar? Una vez que el agua se ha convertido en hielo, ¿se puede convertir de nuevo en agua? Sí. Pero si partimos una manzana en varios pedazos, ¿podemos cambiar las rebanadas a una manzana entera de nuevo?

Los niños pueden observar los cambios más cuidadosamente si usamos medidas. Si hacemos una gráfica para medir su crecimiento o los cambios de temperatura cada día, el niño puede practicar buscando diferencias y midiéndolas—y esto le ayudará a entender cómo puede utilizar sus destrezas matemáticas para aprender sobre las ciencias.

60% voted "yes" for the levy, and 58% said "yes" to the bond. Bonds need 60% to pass.

The proposed combined tax rate of \$6.55 per \$1,000 for the bond and the levy (to have been collected beginning in 2015) was the same rate property owners paid in 2013.

The April 22, 2014 bond proposal includes:

- Technology equipment and infrastructure to support student learning – including infrastructure for robust science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) technology needs
- Renovation of Cascade High School science building to meet science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) requirements
- Energy and HVAC upgrades, roof replacements, ADA upgrades and flooring replacements throughout the district (This is a routine part of the district's 40-year capital facilities plan to maintain schools and extend their useful life beyond the state's 30-year standard.)
- Safety enhancements to school entryways so that visitors enter and leave through one doorway that can be monitored. Schools slated for that work are North Middle and Woodside Elementary, the new elementary school and Hawthorne, Lowell, Madison and Jackson elementary schools
- Modernizing and renovating North Middle School and Woodside Elementary School
- A new elementary in the southern portion of the district to relieve overcrowding in that area
- Expansions, conversions and portables (a total of 40 classrooms) at Silver Firs, Mill Creek, Cedar Wood, Emerson, View Ridge, Jefferson, Woodside, Silver Lake, Forest View, Lowell, Hawthorne and Jackson elementary schools to prepare for full day kindergarten classroom needs (when the state funds staffing for that program, potentially by 2018) and reduced class sizes in grades K-3 (when the state funds staffing for that lower class size, potentially by 2018)

- Phase I of a new high school in the southern part of the district where enrollment is growing the fastest. Cascade and Henry M. Jackson high schools are each well over optimum size of 1,500. Phase I of the high school was anticipated to be approximately 136,000 square feet for approximately 750 students, or one half of a high school. The school would have been master planned for a future build-out to a full-sized, comprehensive high school for 1,500 students when student enrollment projections indicated such construction will be needed.
- Synthetic turf fields at Cascade and Henry M. Jackson high schools

Celebrating Attendance and On-Time Arrival



One of the most important things your child can do to achieve academic success is also one of the most basic: going to school every day. In fact, research has shown that your child's attendance record may be the biggest factor

influencing her academic success. By attending class regularly, your child is more likely to keep up with the daily lessons and assignments, and take quizzes and tests on time. Students who attend school regularly are more likely to pass reading and math assessments than students who don't attend school regularly. Just by being present at school, your child is learning how to be a good citizen by participating in the school community, learning valuable social skills, and developing a broader worldview. Your commitment to school attendance will also send a message to your child that education is a priority for your family, going to school every day is a critical part of educational success, and that it's important to take your responsibilities seriously including going to school.

As a fun way to celebrate you and your children's success at attending school, we at Woodside will be starting a classroom award for attendance and on-time arrival (not being tardy). Starting mid-March, every two weeks, a trophy will be presented to the classroom with the best percentage classroom attendance, including full day, half day, and excused and unexcused absences. A second trophy will be provided to the classroom with the best percentage on time arrival.

News from the Library

Fourth grade finished researching and writing their Rain Garden Brochures just before winter break. Congratulations to Camryn Friis and Sean Turner. Their brochures were sent on to Snohomish County Conservation to be used as informational brochures on what a rain garden is. Snohomish County has already sent them to Forest View Elementary as they are interested in making a rain garden on their property.

I was fortunate to get two grants this year: one from the Audubon Society, and another one from the Snohomish County PUD. With the help of these grants, I will be teaching intermediate students STEM problem solving to research solutions to electricity and renewable energy issues. They will build renewable energy models to prove that their solutions will work.



It will reinforce that renewable energy is an important option for meeting our energy needs. Primary students will be learning about electricity and electrical safety. They will have the opportunity to see renewable energy in action at the library hands-on science table.

With the Audubon grant, I was able to purchase materials that I will be using, along with Mr. Vasei and Mrs. Casey, for our Success Time enrichment lessons. We will be studying about what underground water is and the danger of underground water pollution. Students will become experts in this area and try to solve the mystery of what is polluting the underground water in the city of Fairfax. There will be hands-on investigations that will go along with their research of the topic.

The library kicked off our "Science Challenge" program this fall with our intermediate students. Students have the opportunity to earn multiple Einstein awards by reading a number of selected science books and taking the corresponding AR tests. The program was introduced to second grade students at the end of January. First grade will be starting the program in the spring. Ask your child if they have taken the Science Challenge.

As always, the library is open for AR testing before school on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, for students accompanied by a parent, as I am not always in the library at that time.

What's Happening in Music?

The 3rd, 4th, and 5th Graders have been reading music from the staff using absolute pitch names A, B, C, D, E, F, and G. The letters that go with the lines on the staff are E, G, B, D, and F (Every Good Boy Does Fine). The letters that go with the spaces are F, A, C, and E (FACE). Reading music from the staff is an important skill that we will build on when we start recorders later this month.

2nd Grade is continuing to study individual instruments of the orchestra and instrument families (woodwind, brass, strings, and percussion). The students will be doing various activities with the characters and instruments in the musical story, *Peter and the Wolf*.

1st Graders are preparing for their upcoming concert: *Old McDonald Had a Farm,* which will be on Thursday, March 13 at 7pm. We have been working hard on our songs and look forward to sharing them with you this month!

The Kindergarteners have been experimenting with instrument exploration. We have been playing a variety of instruments including drums, xylophones, sticks, shakers, and triangles as we learn to create music that accompanies or tells a story.

Recorders begin the 2nd week of March!

If you ordered a recorder through Mrs. Hill, they will be passed out the 2nd week of March in music class. If you already own a recorder, please start bringing it to music class the 2nd week of March. If you did not purchase a recorder or you forget your recorder, school recorders are available for use during music class.

Get ready for some...

To encourage the students to practice the recorder, we do recorder karate in music class. The students have the opportunity to earn belts: white,



yellow, green, purple, blue, red, and black with each belt corresponding to a specific song. As the students work through the belts, the songs get more difficult. In addition to earning belts, students can also earn rainbow belts with beads for filling out practice bugs. Music and practice sheets will be sent home once recorders are passed out! Please encourage your child to practice at home and show you the belts they have earned!

To help reinforce music at home, please always encourage your child to show you new or favorite songs from music class. The more each student practices at home, the more progress they will make!
