Excellence

Presented at ceremony

Excellence is putting forth your best effort in all you do regardless of the circumstances or being willing to put your name on your work and have it displayed for all to see.

A group or individual who has achieved something within a curricular area i.e. Tech certification, Fine Arts awards, PSAT/SAT/ACT excellence, etc.

A group or individual who contributes to the development and/or implementation of special programs within the school, community or world

Presented at ceremony

A student or individual who has made a sacrifice for the betterment of others even though it may not have been popular or visible.
