






Bond and levy planning

Enrollment in Everett Public Schools is up and grew to about 19,900 students this fall. Snohomish County is the second fastest growing county in the state and Everett Public Schools continues to experience the highest growth in the county. Many district schools are already at or above capacity and 115 portables have been added to school sites over the years to help address growth. Growth will continue across the region in the coming years, and the district will grow by more than 1,600 students by 2026.

The need for additional schools and classroom space to manage this growth is critical, especially at the high school level. Without a new high school, enrollment at Jackson High School will exceed 2,300 students by 2021 and 30 portables will be required by 2026.

The board is also considering a Replacement Educational Programs and Operations Levy to renew the four-year levy that expires in 2018. The state does not fully fund education, and the levy would provide funding for educational programs and resources to support student learning, including Special education, before- and after-school programs and interventions, safety and security, athletics and activities.

Capital projects updates

The district is hard at work on many projects approved by voters in April 2016. In September, staff rolled out computing devices to five schools as part of the district's first phase of its 1:1 technology initiative. Students at Everett and Sequoia high schools and Garfield, Lowell and Monroe elementary schools now have individual access to technology. The rollout will continue to supply devices and training to several schools each year until all schools are 1:1. See other capital projects updates on the district website.

PART 2 - HOW CAN YOU STAY CONNECTED

Part 2 – How can you stay connected to your teen?

Excerpt from Aha Parenting.

1. Recognize that your teen's fierce need for independence doesn't mean he can't stay connected to you. If you can let your teen exercise his own judgment and be himself, rather than who you want him to be, he'll be able to grow into age-appropriate independence without cutting you off. If, on the other hand, you insist that he play the



sport you love or that she agree with your political views, your teen will have to choose between a relationship with you and his or her integrity.

- 2. Listen. Empathize. Keep advice to a minimum. It doesn't matter how good your advice is. Every time you offer it, you're giving your teen the message that he can't solve his problems himself. Be a sounding board, not a prescriber, and you'll find your teen coming back for more.
- 3. Be available when your teen wants to talk. For most teens, that means late at night over a snack. It's worth a nap, and even setting your alarm for 1am. You'll be amazed at how much more your teen will open up in the wee hours. Most kids don't keep an agenda and bring things up at a scheduled meeting. And nothing makes them clam up faster than pressing them to talk. Kids talk when something is up for them, particularly if you've proven yourself to be a good listener, but not overly attached to their opening up to you. (If you push them to open up, they feel they have to defend their independence by keeping secrets from you.) Find ways to be in proximity where you're both potentially available, without it seeming like a demand. This may seem obvious, but stating your availability invites contact that might not otherwise occur: "I'll be in the study working if you want me" or "I have to run to the grocery store, but don't hesitate to call my cell phone if you need me."

The most important part of staying available is your state of mind. Your child will sense your emotional availability. Parents who have close relationships with their teens often say that as their child has gotten older, they've made it a practice to drop everything else if their teen signals a desire to talk. This can be difficult if you're also handling a demanding job and other responsibilities, of course. But kids who feel that other things are more important to their parents often look elsewhere when they're emotionally needy.

DELAYED START OR CLOSED SCHOOLS

If we have to cancel school or delay the start of school, we will use our parent communication system to call in the morning after 5:45 a.m. with a brief message about the reason for closure or delay. We will also use local media and post the message on our website. If there is no announcement about Everett Schools, school is on the regular schedule.

Attendance Policies

Welcome to the 2017-2018 school year. Please read the information below outlining the CHS Attendance procedures.

To excuse an absence or tardy, please use the following e-mail address:

chsattendance@everettsd.org

1. Written notes (paper) or an e-mail to chsattenddance@everettsd.org are required to excuse a student's absence. You can also send a fax to (425) 385-6002 to excuse your student.

Upon arriving to school, late or leaving early students are required to sign in and sign out of the Attendance Office. If a student is late to school, even if it is during passing time or lunchtime, they are required to come to the Attendance Office to sign in and receive a pass to class.

Students are not permitted to leave school or meet a parent in the parking lot. For safety reasons, parents/guardians on record with the school must come into the Attendance Office to sign out their students.

If a student leaves school without permission and without signing out in the Attendance Office, their absences will remain **unexcused**.

<u>Do NOT text or call your student during class to have them leave</u>. Teachers do not allow students to leave unless the Attendance Office calls to authorize it.

- 2. Students must turn in their notes to excuse previous absences, early dismissals, bus notes, written by a parent, by 10:00 a.m. in the morning. If your student forgets to turn in their absence note, they are welcomed and encouraged to bring it the next morning.
- 3. <u>Notes must be turned in within 30 days after a student returns back to school</u>, not including holidays or weekends, in order to have the absence excused. Notes

turned in past the 30-day timeframe will be accepted; however, the absence is not excused and will be coded with *LN* for *late note*.

- 4. IF you receive a phone call saying your student was marked absent in a class and they say to you, "I was there," please contact the teacher directly about this discrepancy or have your students stop by the attendance office for a pink Attendance Correction Request slip. The student will need to take care of this with the teacher who marked them absent. The teacher is the only one that can give permission to change an absence that is deemed a "mistake" as they are the only one who can verify if a student was in class, in the wrong seat or tardy. The 30 day policy or before 10:00 a.m. policy does not apply for fixing these mistakes.
- 5. If your student is out of school <u>over 5 days due to illness</u>, a <u>doctor's note is</u> required to excuse the <u>absence</u>. Homework can be requested for students out sick over 3 days. Please be aware that we require 24 hour's notice to teachers for homework collection. You are welcome to email teachers directly to request schoolwork.
- 6. **Pre-Arranged absence request:** If your student is going to be out of school due to vacations, surgeries, tournaments, appointments, etc., a pre-arranged absence form is required. These forms are found on-line or in the attendance office. This must be filled out by the student and signed by all teachers along with parent/guardian. The Principal will review and consider all Pre-Arranged absence requests before approval.
- 7. PLEASE know what time your student has lunch or is in a PE class. It is <u>not</u> possible to find your student during lunch and extremely difficult to find them during <u>PE</u>. If you have to pick them up during either of these times, please send a note with your student asking for them to be dismissed at a specific time. Your student will bring that note to the attendance office before school begins to pick up a pass that will allow them to meet you at the attendance office at the time specified.
- 8. Please remember that if your student missed the bus, overslept or is running late, or had car trouble, the absence <u>WILL NOT</u> be excused.
- 9. The following excuses are considered valid and acceptable per the Everett School District Attendance Policy:
