



YOUTH-BASED ACTIVISM





Offers an updated definition of feminism for the twenty-first century, one rooted in inclusion and awareness (can't be read as your single book choice).






The Department of Justice investigated 350 sexual assaults reported to the Missoula police between January 2008 and May 2012.

RACE, RELIGION






This extraordinary work of investigative journalism takes readers inside America's isolated Mormon


SYSTEMIC BIAS, RACE, GOVERNMENT



Argues that the War on Drugs and policies that deny convicted felons equal access to employment, housing, education, and public benefits create a permanent under caste based largely on race.






Essays discuss race relations, segregation, the role of the writer in society, and the work of Andre Gide, Richard Wright, and Norman Mailer.

SYSTEMIC BIAS, RACE, GOVERNMENT



Told through the author's own evolving understanding of the subject over the course of his life comes a bold and personal investigation into America's racial history and its contemporary echoes.


CORRUPTION, RELIGION, ECONOMICS



 We're often told that the United States is, was, and always has been a Christian nation. But in One Nation Under God, historian Kevin M. Kruse reveals that the belief that America is fundamentally and formally Christian originated in the 1930s.


To fight the "slavery" of FDR's New Deal, businessmen enlisted religious activists in a campaign for "freedom under God" that culminated in the election of their ally Dwight Eisenhower in 1952. The new president revolutionized the role of religion in American politics. He inaugurated new traditions like the National Prayer Breakfast, as Congress added the phrase "under God" to the Pledge of Allegiance and made "In God We Trust" the country's first official motto. Church membership soon soared to an all-time high of 69 percent. Americans across the religious and political spectrum agreed that their country was "one nation under God."

SYSTEMIC BIAS, RACE, GOVERNMENT



 This critically acclaimed book features photographs, poems, and interviews with nine children who reveal the hardships and hopes of today's Mexican-American migrant farm workers and their families.




ECONOMICS / BEHAVIOR SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY



The author offers his view of how the economy really works, examining issues from cheating and crime to sports and childrearing, offering a very different view on what drives the economy.






Traces the history of the Starbucks

CLIMATE CHANGE, ENVIRONMENTALISM



Long known for her insightful and thought-provoking political journalism, author Elizabeth Kolbert now tackles the controversial and increasingly urgent subject of global warming. In what began as groundbreaking three-part series in the New Yorker, for which she won a National Magazine Award in 2006, Kolbert cuts through the competing rhetoric and political agendas to elucidate for Americans what is really going on with the global environment and asks what, if anything, can be done to save our planet.



"Reduce, reuse, recycle" urge environmentalists; in other words, do more with less in order to minimize damage. But as this provocative, visionary book argues, this approach perpetuates a oneway, "cradle to grave" manufacturing model that dates to the Industrial Revolution and casts off as much as 90 percent of the materials it uses as waste, much of it toxic. Why not challenge the notion that human industry must inevitably damage the natural world?
