Summer Reading Assignment :

1. Choose 5 chapters from the following book that you think would be interesting to read about:

<u>A People's History of the United States: 1492 – Present</u> by Howard Zinn ISBN 0-06-052837-0

You may purchase this book or borrow it from our library. There are both hardback and paperback editions. The hardback can run about \$30 new and the paperback about \$12 new. Of course, you may be able to find it at half price books or on-line for less. Let me know if you have problems getting the book.

2. Journal. (Can be typed or hand written, scored separately from the Critical Review)

For each chapter of the book, write your reaction to what you have read. You may also recap or summarize the information included in the chapter in order to help you write your critical review of these chapters. Therefore, your journal will have 5 entries. Take time to journal well and your paper will be a breeze!

3. A Critical Review of the chapters you read:

Type (double spaced) leaving generous margins. Include the information specified below. Edit your draft and keep a copy of your final effort. Final paper should be one to three pages in length.

- Describe the chapters you chose in general terms. What issues do they address? What time period do they address?
- Identify any major thesis you can discern. The major thesis would reflect the author's general point of view or belief.
- Explain the author's main contentions and discuss them giving evidence (concrete details from the book and analysis).
- Deliver chief objections and summarize shortcomings. If you find errors, mention the important ones.
- Address the following:
 - How did reading these chapters change your conception of the topic?
 - What additional work needs to be done in order to clear up doubtful points?
 - What gaps still need to be filled?
- Give information about the author.
- End by summarizing your opinion of the merits and faults of the chapters you read.
- Paper is to be 7-10 paragraphs. Use one paragraph for each of the above points.

4. Choose **3** of American history films such as the films listed below to watch over the summer. Be prepared to discuss them on the first day of class. You may choose a film not on the list just email me to let me know what you have chosen to make sure it fits the criteria. Fill out the attached worksheet for each film you watch. There is a copy on my web site of the worksheet and these directions. The school library has some historical films as well as the public library. Some of these films can be found on-line as well on Netflix, Amazon and YouTube.
