From the Principal

Dear Cascade Families,

As we move into 2022, I want to share my gratitude for the support of the entire community in continually challenging times. We certainly look forward to and hope for positive developments in this new year.

As we come back from winter break, we will have finished roughly 2/5 of our school year, and will still have close to 20 days of our first semester to increase engagement and improve performance. Teachers are ready and available to help and provide support to students, but it is important to not wait too long. Teachers often want to provide support but are met with limitations when students or parents ask so close to the end of the semester. If your student is struggling, there is no better way to get help than to connect with your child's teachers as soon as possible to request support.

As we move into 2022, it is also important to recognize and be aware that the Everett Public Schools Board of Directors approved two replacement levies to be voted on this February. Both of these levies replace existing levies that will be expiring this calendar year, with one being for educational programs and operations, and the other being for essential projects like technology and safety/security improvements. Information on these levies can be found at https://www.everettsd.org/2022Levies and includes a breakdown on what these levies fund and what systems and locations they would impact. Finally, I just wanted to share a few items that I believe should give us all hope as we enter this new year:

- Each year we take the Panorama Survey, which is a measure designed to look at student perceptions of a number of items (school culture, academics, their own abilities, etc.). We celebrate seeing both relatively good participation as well as data that indicates that our student body is growing in their belief that they can make Cascade a welcoming, safe, and inclusive environment. Data points have consistently grown over the past few years in student sense of safety and in student sense of belonging. It is our responsibility as an entire community to keep growing those areas in service of a more effective and welcoming school community. Great work Bruins!
- ✓ Part of our values and goals as a school and as a district revolve around preparing all students for life after high school and to that end, our staff members are still working hard to help our seniors complete their FAFSA and submit their college applications. In fact, nearly a quarter of the Class of 2022 have already completed their FAFSA. Let's keep that good work going Bruins!

CANNED FOOD ITEMS: 40,477.5

Our students collected all these cans at 7 grocery stores over 16 days. THIS IS AMAZING! On weekdays, students canned for 27 hours each day (4.5 hours at 6 stores) and on weekends, students canned for approximately 36 hours each day... and with 2-3 kids at each canning location, our Bruins may have spent an approximate 1,404 hours canning during our food drive.

SHOPPING and WRAPPING DAY:

Over 300 students, 50+ alumni, and numerous staff helped to coordinate the Wrapping Day in the Library and Shopping Day in the gym. We boxed up food and wrapped gifts for over 120+ families, many of which are families of our Cascade students – several were also families of Everett HS families and from our feeder middle and elementary schools. The food required over 1,100 boxes and labels (thank you to Catherine Shaw for making the labels!!)

Rachel Raine and Jill Jackson oversaw the massive undertaking of Shopping Day in the library, with the support of many staff members and classrooms who came into wrap up the gifts for those 393 children. Special shout out to Ms. Patrick's Freshman Leadership Class and Mrs. Jackson's students for leading the charge on the Giving Tree!

Thanks to all of you for boxing and pre-sorting your food, we finished sorting food just after 1pm. This makes this day so efficient for our students! Thank you to Mr. Hull, Ms. Hodgins, and Mr. Bertrand, and Ms. Jacobs who brought in their PE classes during the day to help unload all the pallets off the Safeway semi-truck and sort out the over 40,000 food items in the gym!

Michelle Crews and Rhonda Covert and alumni Spencer Bowlden oversaw the placement of the packaged food for each of the families and organizations. Fitting 1,100 boxes in to ½ of the gym is no easy task, but they manage to do it flawlessly year after year!

Bruin Community Parents and several students served dinner and brought in desserts and snacks to keep the students hydrated and fed during the sorting and shopping process- thank you, BCP!

DELIVERY DAY:

100 students and 30+ alumni departed in ~35 vehicles to deliver food to our families and food

banks. Two of our fabulous students, freshman Ben and senior Josephine, were able to help translate in Russian and Spanish via phone for our delivery teams when needed. We also appreciate the students working in the Safeway aisle and with Ms. Jackson who helped move in carts and make sure the right gifts made it to the right families.

We had the gym cleaned and swept by 12:30pm – RECORD TIME!! We sent a crazy amount of extra food to the fill the shelves at the food banks of the Salvation Army, Volunteers of America, and Mill Creek Food Banks.

Way to go, Bruins! Let's do it again next year!



January is School Board Appreciation Month

The month of January marks the annual observance of School Board Recognition – a time to salute the work of school board members and celebrate public education. You can learn more about <u>board members online</u>. You can also <u>watch past school board meetings</u> on the district's YouTube channel. The Washington State School Directors Association (WSSDA) honors exemplary school boards that improve student learning and follow best practices of governance. Everett Public Schools Board of Directors has earned this honor for the sixth time this year for presenting exemplary evidence of ongoing professional development, addressing opportunity gaps and practicing governance that reflects the Washington School Board Standards.

Replacement levies on February 8 ballot

Everett Public Schools has two replacement levy measures on the February 8, 2022 ballot. Both levies replace existing levies that expire at the end of 2022.

Having good schools and facilities has a positive effect on our neighborhoods. Better schools help build a stronger community, which will improve our quality of life, keep crime down, and help increase the values of our homes.

All students should be given the same opportunities regardless of their abilities, backgrounds, or family income. This funding will ensure all students in Everett Public Schools have the same opportunities to learn, grow and succeed.



Proposition 1 - Replacement Educational Programs & Operations Levy (EP&O)

Local EP&O levy funding allows us to provide the quality education our community expects for our students, which goes beyond the minimum funded by the state. For instance, the state funds 3 district nurses and we have 12. They fund \$35 million for special education that costs us \$45 million to provide. This levy covers these and other basic operating expenses.

Proposition 2 - Replacement Capital Levy

The replacement capital levy provides funding to acquire, improve or maintain school facilities in the four categories below:

- Technology \$96M
 - Our students benefit from ongoing integration of technology into their learning.
- Increased safety and security \$2M
 - Our students will learn in buildings that are safer and more secure
- Equal access, same experience \$172M

Every student in our district will have the same opportunity to learn in well-functioning, safe and modern spaces.

• Maintenance and mandatory upgrades \$54M

Our facilities are valuable community assets and will be maintained to increase their life expectancy and comply with state mandated upgrades.

Exacciones de reemplazo en la boleta electoral del 8 de febrero

Las escuelas de Everett Public Schools tiene dos medidas de reemplazo de exacciones para la boleta electoral del 8 de febrero de 2022. Las dos exacciones remplazan a las actuales existentes que se vencen a finales del 2022.

El tener buenas escuelas e instalaciones da un efecto positivo a nuestras comunidades. Tener mejores escuelas ayudan a construir comunidades fuertes, por la cual mejora la calidad de vida, mantiene el nivel de criminalidad bajo y ayuda aumentar el valor catastral de nuestras viviendas.

Todos los estudiantes deben tener las mismas oportunidades sin importar sus capacidades, antecedentes o ingresos familiares. Estos fondos asegurarán que todos los estudiantes de las Escuelas Públicas de Everett tengan las mismas oportunidades para aprender, crecer y ser exitosos.



Proposición 1 - Reemplazo de la exacción de programas educativos y de operaciones (EP&O)

Los fondos locales de gravamen o impuestos EP&O nos permite brindar educación de calidad que nuestra comunidad espera para nuestros estudiantes que va más allá del financiamiento mínimo del estado. Por ejemplo, el estado financia 3 enfermeras del distrito y tenemos 12. Financian \$35 millones para educación especial la cual nos cuesta \$45 millones para ofrecerla. Este impuesto cubre estos y otros gastos de operación básicos.

Proposición 2 - Remplazo del impuesto capital

El reemplazo de la exacción capital provee fondos para adquirir, mejorar o mantener las instalaciones escolares y las siguientes cuatro categorías:

- Tecnología \$96M
 - Nuestros estudiantes se benefician de la continua integración de la tecnología dentro de su aprendizaje.
- Aumento a la seguridad y a la vigilancia \$2M

Nuestros estudiantes aprenderán en planteles que son más seguros y más vigilados.

- Acceso equitativo, misma experiencia \$172M
 - Cada uno de los estudiantes en nuestro distrito tendrá las mismas oportunidades para aprender en espacios funcionalmente buenos, seguros y modernos.
- Mantenimiento y actualizaciones obligatorias \$54M
 - Nuestras instalaciones son los activos más valiosos de la comunidad y serán mantenidos para incrementar su esperanza de vida y para cumplir con las actualizaciones exigidas por el estado.
