From the Principal

Dear Cascade Families,

Winter sports are upon us! Girl's bowling starts on Monday, November 1st. All other winter sports (boys and girls' basketball, boys and girls wrestling, and boys swimming) begin on Monday, November 15th. All winter sports paperwork is due by **Tuesday, November 9th** (girls bowling paperwork is due ASAP)

To compete in a winter sport, you must have a current sport physical and all eligibility information completed in Rank One.

Click <u>here</u> for Rank One. There are 4 forms that need to be completed online (informed consent, parental release of information, athletic emergency information, and eligibility questionnaire):

Parents: If your student is participating in a winter sport, there will be a **mandatory** parent meeting on Monday, November 22nd in the evening. More details to come, but this will be a zoom meeting with all parents together, followed by a second zoom meeting with your specific sports coaches.

COVID information as it relates to winter sports:

• Basketball and wrestling are considered high risk sports because of close contact. All athletes participating in basketball and wrestling will be required to complete a rapid COVID test at the school twice per week **UNLESS** they are fully vaccinated. If students are fully vaccinated, they can provide the school proof of vaccination and will not be required to test. Please keep this in mind as we get ready to start our seasons.

A few important reminders from the Bruins Health Team.

- Students CANNOT be in school with symptoms. Students experiencing the following symptoms may NOT be on campus (even with a negative covid test and despite vaccination status):
 - o Headache
 - o Muscle Pain or body aches
 - o Sore throat
 - Congestion or runny nose
 - Nausea or vomiting
 - o Diarrhea
 - o Fatigue
 - o Fever
 - o Cough
 - Loss of taste or smell
 - Chills
 - Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- If you come to school with symptoms, you will be placed on Quarantine and sent home.
 - If placed on quarantine, you may not come back to campus until you have been cleared by the nurse.
 - **Do NOT call the health room to be cleared.** The number for the nurse is on the Quarantine letter sent home with your student.
 - Please wait until ALL your symptoms have been gone for a full 24 hours before calling the nurse.
 - Leave a voicemail. Your call will be returned in the order received.
 - Do not return to campus until the nurse clears you to do so.

 If you live in Everett and receive an error message after submitting your zip code that states there are no services in your area, it is likely that we have reached our application limit. Please don't worry. Often times there are duplications in the system, and they will be cleared soon. You can reach out to the email address below for assistance.

- Begin the online application process
 Once you have completed the first page of the form, a pop-up will appear notifying you that a link specific to your application has been emailed to you to get back to your personal application should you happen to have internet trouble or need to finish completing the application at another time

Self Esteem

Most parents feel passionately about their children and only want the best for them. But what is self-esteem and self-worth?

What is self-esteem and self-worth?

We all begin life with a simple view of the world. As young children we trust easily and freely, we are full of adventure and life is full of possibilities. As we grow up, we learn to listen to what others think of us and what society tells we should be like. As we grow up, we look to the people closest to us to confirm or reject these ideas of ourselves. This all goes a long way to shaping our self-worth.

When you are positive with your children, encouraging them to feel good about themselves, you are building the foundations for a person who will be resilient later in life. They'll be better able to cope with life's ups and downs, trust their own judgement, see their potential and be more confident.

Start with you

You can usually get some clues from how you feel about yourself. How easy is it to list the things you really like about yourself? Can you be honest about your weaknesses without feeling like a total failure? Do you respect and look after yourself and expect the same from others? Look around and notice your achievements and don't overlook the little things! You don't have to be perfect – just feel that you are equal to those around you.

If this is really difficult, you're not alone. Many of us take on negative messages about being "over-confident" or "arrogant" but self-esteem is about the ability to be realistic. Most of us have strengths and weaknesses; self -worth is about recognizing both and still feeling ok about who you are.

Building self-worth in your teenagers

Encourage your young person to develop a sense of who they are. Find out what they believe in. What are their values in life? What qualities do they think are important and why? What does it mean to be trustworthy, honest, loyal, and courageous or compassionate, for example?

Most teenagers welcome a bit of healthy debate – they may hold very different views from yours but encourage them to think things through for themselves. Difference is ok; understanding that we can have different views to others can help them build necessary skills in accessing situations, making judgements and being tolerant.

Having healthy relationships is also an important part of your self-worth, so talk to your children about their friendships, relationships with teachers and family friends. What kind of qualities do they look for in a friend? What kind of friend are they? What is difficult and what works to resolve difficulties? Feelings can be powerful and overwhelming for many young people particularly in adolescence but talk about how they can express their feelings appropriately and safely.

What you can do

Accept strengths and weaknesses

Everyone has areas they can work on. But we're often much better at identifying these than the things we're good at. Look for opportunities to point out their successes, don't let a small achievement go unnoticed. Let them know the qualities you admire or like about them and why.

If you need to be constructively critical, be specific, avoid personal attacks and be prepared to give an example. "You're lazy, useless and treat this house like a hotel" could be "I get really frustrated when I have to climb over the mess in your room – please could you try to be a bit more tidy?"



Allow independence

Persuade them to take a pride in themselves, take good care of themselves. Look after their health, eat properly, and understand the importance of looking after their minds and bodies. Having self-respect means that we value ourselves and we are much less likely to be treated disrespectfully by others.

Deal with change

Develop a healthy attitude to change in all aspects of life. Enable them to see it as the natural way of the world, the ebb and flow of life. Where you can, allow them to have control over how they adapt to changes. Talk through managing change, understanding that change can be both fearful and exciting. Talk abut how you can resolve problems as they arise, what are the different options, benefits and losses, all skills to build confidence in making decisions.

Encourage their aspirations

Everyone needs to know where they're going. Allow our young person to want to rule the world, go into space, invent an alternative fuel or be the next prime minister if they really want to. As they shape their future before them, their goals will become increasingly realistic but should challenge them just a little. Talk to them about how they hope to achieve their goals in life, what do they need to get there, who can help and what can they do now?

Once you've downloaded the app, log in to "student info" with your LMS password to see student-specific information for each of your children. Read content in one of many languages available in the settings. You are also able to set your delivery preferences.

Receive information the way you prefer

Thank you to all who were able to participate in our September 18 Let's Connect session. One of the action items that came from the session was to remind parents how to select their preferred method of communication so they will not get the same message in multiple formats unless they choose to. Below are some steps you can take:

- Download the district's mobile app. One of the many features is to select your delivery preferences. Once you have signed into your account, click on your profile tile and then "Edit Delivery Preferences" at the top.
 - Click on the icon for app, text, phone or email to turn off that mode. Green indicates the mode is turned on. Some modes are locked, as indicated with the lock in the upper corner of the icon.
- Keep your contact information current by updating the "Annual Student Update Form 2021-2022" in Home Access Center or by letting your school office know anytime there is a change.
- Please visit the communications department webpage for a list of timely and relevant information to strengthen connections among families, staff, and community.
