

Why was the EU Created?

• Rivalries and war between European countries was common for more than 500 years.





World War I (1914-1918)
About 10 million soldiers died, 20 million wounded; 8 million civilians died.



Why was the EU Created?

• European countries wanted to create economic ties to try to prevent future wars.

Step 1: Formation

• 1952:

European Coal and Steel Community.

- Coal and steel were necessary for the machinery of war. Open trade of these products would reduce tensions.
- France, Belgium, West Germany, Italy, Netherlands, and Luxemburg.



Step 2: Expansion through 1985

- Changed name to:
 European Economic Community (EEC).
- Expanded to include most trade goods.
- Grew to 12 members (added Denmark, the UK, Ireland, Greece, Spain, and Portugal).



Collapse of the Soviet Union

- 1989-1990: Communist government of the USSR dissolves.
- Chain reaction of 13 countries declared independence from Russia.
- Warsaw Pact broke up.
- 1990: East and West Germany reunited into a single country again.





Step 4: More Expansion

- 2007: name changed to *European Union*.
- by 2013: grew to 28 countries, including several that used to be part of the USSR or Warsaw Pact.

Benefits of the El



- Free trade (no tariffs or trade taxes).
- Freely travel between EU countries.
- Can work and live in any EU country.
- Cooperation in environmental laws.
- One common currency (the Euro)

Tensions within the EU



- Loss of cultural identity & autonomy.
- Can be challenging to get all EU country to agree on rules & laws.
- Poorer EU countries are a drain on wealthy EU countries.





- There are currently 5 countries in the process of joining the EU. (Turkey, Albania, Macedonia, Montenegro, and Serbia)
- In 2016, the UK voted to leave the EU. This is called "Brexit" (British Exit). Scheduled to be finalized in 2019.
