# **Course Description**

NJROTC is a Navy-sponsored program developed to instill the values of citizenship using the Core Values of the Navy—honor, courage, and commitment. First year cadets will be introduced to military drill, Navy customs and courtesies, the Navy Uniform, learn about the history of the JROTC programs, values of followership and leadership, and the mission of the United States Navy.



When REP Everett classroom and virtual agreements are not met resulting in the disruption in learning for students the following process will be followed:

- 1. First incident: Conversation with the student
- 2. Second incident: Conversation with the student and parent/guardian contact
- 3. Third incident: Conversation with the student, parent/guardian contact, office referral





# Classroom conduct:

- **RESPECT for others** is stressed, both as a fundamental principle of good leadership and as a requirement in my classroom. In discussions, *challenge the idea*, not the person.

- CELL PHONES AND OTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICES WILL BE PLACED IN SILENT MODE OR TURNED OFF. In accordance with district policy use of personal electronic devices (PEDs i.e. cell phones) are prohibited for use during class. The NS1 classroom will be treated like a Sensitive Compartmented Information Facility (SCIF pronounced skiff). Just like many areas in a military facility all personnel are prohibited from bringing PEDs into these areas. Upon entering the classroom phones will be placed in silent mode (not vibrate) or turned off and placed in the compartments provided in the classroom. Cadets will be informed daily to "REP with your Phone/PED" in accordance with school policy. This will be the cadets first notification. If the cadet is seen using a PED during class, the cadet will be reminded to "REP with your Phone/PED." This will serve as their second notification. If the cadet is seen using a PED after the second notification, they will be handed a PED violation slip and reported to the school administration. PARENTS/GUARDIANS IF A FAMILY EMERGENCY ARISES AND YOU NEED TO CONTACT YOUR CHILD PLEASE CALL THE MAIN OFFICE AT 425-385-4400.

- **REMOVE** all headgear of any type (hats, hoodies, etc.) and headphones (PED), unless required by religious obligations.

- **RESPECT** the furniture. Utilized furniture as they were intended to be used. Keep feet off the furniture. Our campus is open to the environment the chances of stepping on something is high.

- **DO NOT THROW anything.** If you need to pass a material to a fellow cadet or put something in the trash – do so smartly with little distraction. The only exception to throwing will be during **monitored team building exercises** conducted by Commander Gile or Senior Chief Estrella.

- Beverages and snacks are permitted, but you must clean up after yourself and do not forget to recycle – or these privileges will be revoked. Drinks must be in a closeable container and closed when not in use.

### **Grading**

The EHS purpose for grading is to communicate information about student proficiency on content standards. Students and parents can access grades online through the LMS system. Student grades will be based on consideration of four factors:

- Wearing of the NJROTC Uniform and Physical Training Uniform (when issued)
- Quizzes and projects
- Military Performance
- Homework/Classwork

Late work will be accepted; however, cadets will not receive full credit for the assignment. Cadets who are unable to meet assignment deadlines must request an extension and explain the reason.

# **Expectations while in Uniform**

Unless otherwise notified, PT uniform and NJROTC uniform will be worn on Wednesday and Friday respectively. Uniform Inspections are a part of the cadet's grades. Each cadet will learn the specific guidelines about required grooming standards.

**For females** – (while in uniform) – hair should be put up in such a way that it doesn't fall below the collar of the uniform, faddish styles or unnaturally colored hair is not allowed, fingernails shall be either unpolished, a "French" manicure style or colored comparable to the cadet's natural skin color.

**For males** – (while in uniform) – hair shall be cut and tapered above the ears, and no more than 4 inches in length, or 2 inched in bulk on top of the head. Close, clean shaves are required with no beards, no sideburns lower than halfway down the ears, and no moustaches extending beyond the lip line or the corners of the mouth. No unnatural colored hair. Face piercings or earrings are prohibited while in uniform.

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** On designated uniform days, the uniform MUST be properly worn the ENTIRE school day – not just during the NJROTC class period. Cadets who fail to adhere to this requirement risk losing grade points they may have earned earlier in the day during their inspection.

Uniforms belong to the U.S. government, and MUST be returned when a cadet exits the program. COSTS OF CLEANING AND REPLACING UNIFORMS ARE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CADET. FAILING TO DO SO CAN BE A FINANCIAL OBLIGATION THAT OBSTRUCTS FINAL HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION.

# Non-Divisional competitive teams include:

• Orienteering Team

Competes in the Washington Interscholastic Orienteering League (WIOL) Winter League from November to Feburary. The Winter League is the Pacific Northwest's premier competitive orienteering series for all ages: Elementary, Middle School, High School, and Collegiate students, and adults. We also offer non-competitive categories at every event. Competitor learn to read topographic maps, use a compass, make route choices, and problem solve when things don't go as expected. As students improve, these skills are used while running, providing a challenge for both mind and body.

• CyberPatriot

Competes nationally against more than 1000 CyberPatriot teams. The National Youth Cyber Defense Competition, which puts teams of high school and middle school students in the position of newly hired IT professionals tasked with managing the network of a small company. Through a series of online competition rounds, teams are given a set of virtual operating systems and are tasked with finding and fixing cybersecurity vulnerabilities while maintaining critical services. The top teams in the nation earn all-expenses-paid trips to





Maryland for the National Finals Competition where they can earn national recognition and scholarship money.

# **Everett High School Reassessment Policy**

- All students will have the opportunity to retake summative assessments. Formative assessments and assignments may be redone at the discretion of the teacher.
- Retakes may not apply to long-term, multi-step assessments such as research papers, projects or presentation. In many of these cases, students receive feedback on each step of the process and have multiple opportunities to redo portions of the paper or project before final submission.
- Prior to a reassessment, students must provide evidence that relearning has occurred by completing a reassessment plan including the required formative and corrective work as determined by the teacher.
- Students must complete reassessments within a reasonable amount of time allowing for reteaching/relearning to take place. Reassessment plans (departmentally developed) should be complete within 7 school days of the original assessment and prior to the last two weeks of the current term.
- Students may be reassessed on a portion of the summative assessment, the entire summative assessment, or in a completely different format as determined by the teacher.





- The higher of the two grades will be recorded.
- All laws, statutes and policies pertaining to IEP or 504 accommodation plans remain in place and must be followed

# Academic Honesty

At Everett High School we value honesty and integrity of work. Cheating on tests and homework by copying other people's work is not acceptable. Making copies of someone's computer disk is also considered cheating. When you cheat, you will receive a failing grade for that learning activity. Cheating also includes the aiding and abetting of cheating by others.

Plagiarism, the act of borrowing another author's work without crediting that author and thereby implying that it is one's own, is academically dishonest and a form of cheating. Students found cheating or plagiarizing will be referred to school administration.
