"Resiliency"

Have you heard of this word? Merriam-Webster and Oxford dictionaries define it as an ability to recover from or adjust easily to <u>adversity</u> or change and the ability of a substance or object to spring back into shape; elasticity. It is this quality that allows us to overcome challenges, obstacles, hardship, and adversity instead of being defeated by them.

In an article by <u>Forbes Magazine</u>, they agreed that the word of the year is "Resilience." This word was chosen because all of us across the world have and are overcoming the challenges in our lives from this last year. We are here, we are doing the best we can, and WE are amazing.

News from our Math Coach

Is Common Core math really a harder, more confusing math? When I first started teaching, I found teaching subtraction with regrouping a daunting task. For example, saying things like "carry the one" was confusing. Especially because it doesn't represent just one, but is a set of ten, hundred, or even a thousand! Students can much better understand concepts when they have a broader understanding that is not solely built on rules and sequential steps. For example, a lot of regrouping ("carrying" or crossing out, etc.) would be required to do a problem like 1,460-992. But if students are encouraged to think of real quantities, it becomes easier! You could ask a child: What round number is 992 close to? (1.000) Then: What if we subtracted that instead? (1,460 minus 1,000 is 460). But we only want to take away 992, so how many would we add back? (993, 994, 995, 996, 997, 998, 999, 1000 ... That equals 8.) And so 460+8 is 468. Approaches like this make life easier, even into adulthood. I don't know about you, but this way would be much easier when standing in

the supermarket line! Not to say that steps and algorithms have no place. In fact, students who have been encouraged to make sense of numbers, have a much easier time when learning to regroup in later grades. They are less likely to ask, "Why are you carrying a one?" and instead, understand what that "one" truly means. Check out this article from <u>Business</u> Insider.

*Tip: When multiplying by multiples of 10, tell students that we aren't just "adding zeroes." That would keep it the same, because that's what adding zero does! Instead, encourage them to think about the zero as a "bumper" that is "bumping" digits to the left, making them ten times bigger with each move than the place to their right!

Spanish immersion program

This program gives elementary students an opportunity to complete the Everett Public Schools curriculum in a nontraditional and exciting way by immersing them in Spanish language and culture from kindergarten through twelfth grade. Students in the program will become proficient in both Spanish and English while

learning the same curriculum content as their peers outside the program. Priority will be given to students within the Emerson Elementary School attendance area. If a high number of students apply, a lottery will be conducted to select students. If the class is not filled from those in the Emerson attendance area, an additional lottery from beyond the school attendance area will be conducted.

- 2. Online: If you have a valid Washington state driver's license, you may register with the <u>Secretary of State</u> quickly and easily online. You may also download a voter registration form in several languages from that site.
