### **News from the Virtual Gym**

Hello, Jefferson students and families! With sunnier and drier weather, May is a great month for outdoor activities. You might remember that the CDC recommends children ages 6-17 do at least 60 minutes of heart-pumping physical activity each day for their body, brain and emotional health. This should be a balance of aerobic activity and activities that strengthen bones (like running or jumping) and build muscles (like climbing or push-ups).

Students have been learning about nutrition and healthy eating choices that fuel their body and mind, and help balance emotions. Students have been learning about the five food groups, as well as "Go" foods (those with a lot of nutrition that can be eaten often), "Slow" foods (some nutrition that can be eaten in moderation), and "Whoa" foods (little or no nutrition that should be limited in the diet). Learning about the body will help students make better choices to be healthy, happy, and safe.

Here is an excerpt from the math department about our new curriculum, Illustrative Mathematics, which is also currently in our middle and high schools: "Committee members across each group selected Illustrative Mathematics as the clear favorite choice for a multitude of reasons including the curricula's alignment to Common Core Standards; the embedded instructional supports for the Effective Math Teaching Practices from NCTM; the connection to 6-12 EPS math curriculum allowing families to access the same information. format and supports whether they have an elementary, middle or high school student; its technology integration components; and the program's commitment to dismantling barriers to achievement in mathematics providing access and opportunity for each and every student." ## Connecting with counselors video series

Two new series of videos are now available on the district's Parent University webpage: Healthy and Safe Social Time for Teens and Helping your Child Respond to Stress.



In the series Healthy and Safe Social Time for Teens, MTSS Facilitator Kristin Walker and

North Middle School Counselor Susie Smothers discuss how parents can support healthy and safe social time for teens and pre-teens.

The series includes videos on the following topics:

- <u>Video 1: Introduction to the Series and Maintaining Social Connections</u> Adolescence is a stage in life when social connections and experiences are a healthy and critical part of development. Not being able to see friends, go to school events, and play sports can cause sadness and major disappointment for teens and pre-teens and many parents are struggling with the best way to help them cope. Learn about healthy ways kids can maintain social connections while following health and safety guidelines.
- <u>Video 2: Supporting Healthy Online Boundaries</u> With so many healthy and creative ways for kids to socialize online during the pandemic, our counselors share ways to set and balance responsible online boundaries for your teen.
- <u>Video 3: Social Connections at School</u> As was the case before the pandemic, students can still participate in a variety of extracurricular activities after school. Encourage your child to get involved. Reach out to your school to find out what is available. Many schools are still offering a variety of clubs and organizations your child can join to stay connected with peers.



- <u>Video 4: Family Social Opportunities</u> With many parents working from home at this time, families should try to carve out unplugged time together. Watch this video for suggested ways the whole family can engage in social activities together.
- Video 5: Supporting Your Child's Struggle Pandemic fatigue is a real thing. Coronavirus has put a strain on our everyday functioning and teens may display a range of emotions including sadness, anger, frustration, depression, and more. Learn strategies to listen empathetically to your teen as a way to acknowledge their experiences without trying to "minimize" or "fix" the situation.

In the series Helping your Child Respond to Stress, MTSS Facilitator Kristin Walker and Evergreen Middle School Counselor Dr. Kaley Mitchell help us understand and define stress and offer action-oriented strategies for parents to help their children as they exhibit emotional and behavioral signs of stress. The series includes videos on the following topics:

- <u>Video 1: Understanding Stress</u> Many parents are asking "Why is my child so stressed out?" Stress is dominating our
  world and society, and both adults and children are stressed at more intense levels than ever before. In this video, Evergreen
  Middle School Counselor Dr. Kaley Mitchell helps parents understand the history, biology, and experiences that lead to feeling
  stress.
- <u>Video 2: Opposite Action Strategy</u> In this video, learn about the "Opposite Action" strategy to help your teen or pre-teen respond to stress. Opposite Action is doing the opposite of your urge when your urge is not helpful or healthy and is a skill that can help children (and adults too!) to respond to stress in a healthier, more effective way.
- <u>Video 3: Cold Water Strategy</u> Is your child exhibiting heightened signs of anxiety or intense emotions? The Cold Water strategy can help! The Cold Water strategy is the act of using cold water on the face or body to bring anxiety down immediately. Learn more in this informative video.
- <u>Video 4: What if we need help?</u> If coping mechanisms just aren't working, learn when you should seek immediate help for your child. Also learn more about school, local, and national resources of support such as mental health counseling, crisis lines, and more.

We truly appreciate your time and participation. Your feedback is very important to us as we set and evaluate school improvement goals.




## 2021-22 Student Rights and Responsibilities Handbook
