Value is an element of art that refers to the lightness or darkness of colors or tones used in an artwork. Artists use value to create depth and make objects look three-dimensional by adding highlights and shadows. Students practiced this concept by mixing paint to create a value scale. For their final project, they painted a colored pencil that appeared three-dimensional on two-dimensional paper.
