Dear Families and Special Educators,

Welcome to the 2021-22 school year—what a year it will be. So excited to see all the growth in students and new skills staff will learn. Kudos to our staff that have been learning a new IEP program. We had to transition to a new program this year and our staff have been rocking the implementation.

We are still dealing with the effects of the pandemic—the virus keeps all of us on our toes. I am so pleased to see that all staff are working on our behavior expectation of wearing masks. I have seen teachers reinforce the use of them in all classrooms. This is one way to stop the spread of COVID.

A process is being developed to help IEP teams determine the amount of recovery services each student will get. The conversations about these services will be had at the annual IEP meeting. If the meeting has already occurred, the case manager will be contacting families for a meeting to talk specifically about these services. We have some fun ideas floating around and will be utilizing outside vendors and our own staff to provide the services. Most of the services will begin in the new year after winter break in 6-to-8-week cycles. We are planning of offering Recovery Services in the Summer of 2022, as well.

During our Professional Development Day on August 30 all staff were given the opportunity to participate in a 6-hour day filled with opportunities to learn new skills. We had a great lineup which included, Strength Based IEPs, Universal Design for Learning, Mindfulness, High School and Beyond Planning, Curriculum Training, Assistive Technology and many more. Many of our classroom teachers and related service staff were the presenters for these workshops. So happy to spotlight our practicing staff.

Looking at the future we are working on ways to support more inclusive practices across our system. Our department has been working with the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Department to increase awareness of the importance of closing the opportunity gap for students with disabilities. October 15th the entire school district staff will be participating in a day of Equity Professional Development which will include opportunities for all staff to learn about ways to create opportunities for students with disabilities to increase participation with their typically developing peers, in the classroom and in the community, as a whole.
